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1. Course Description

The course is designed to facilitate students to develop academic writing skills in Religious Studies with support from other class members and the instructor. Students are encouraged to pursue their own academic interests, informed by the themes or topics they have encountered in taught components of the Religious Studies Program, and to develop appropriate research strategies to explore the study questions, develop a sustained argument, as well as effective academic writing and presentation skills. Students will be asked to present orally in a seminar setting, where the participants will have an opportunity to respond to the presentations.

2. Learning outcomes

Upon completing the course, students should be able to:

- Identify a research topic;
- Collect and synthesize evidence from a wide range of primary and secondary sources applicable to the study of religion;
- Express ideas and arguments clearly;
- Organize the arguments into an organic and coherent essay;
- Do oral presentation in precise ways.

Tutorial Presentation:

- All students are divided into 4 groups, and each group need to present an academic article (either in Chinese or English) corresponding to the following research approaches:
- 1. Textual approach
- 2. Historical approach
- 3. Comparative approach
- 4. Field work study
- The students should analyze the content of the article and comment on the application of specific research approach.
- 30 minutes for presentation; 15 minutes for discussion.
- All presentation scores are calculated on a group basis.

Group Presentation:

- All students are divided into 4 groups, and each group need to present their proposal of final group paper.
- 30 minutes for presentation; 15 minutes for discussion.
- Presenters are encouraged to utilize visual aids (e.g., hand-outs, PowerPoint©), and to make their presentations understandable to non-specialists.
- All presentation scores are calculated on a group basis.

Final Group Paper:

- The paper should be about 5000 words (either in Chinese or English), dealing with a defined scholarly question and topic.
- The paper should demonstrate appropriate research skills, including the abilities to collect information, to exercise critical judgment, and to present the arguments in a clear and organized manner.
- Papers should be handed in via VeriGuide and submit on Blackboard by <u>23:59 on 27/4 (Sunday)</u>, <u>2025</u>. Delayed submission of assignment without reasonable explanation may result in grade deduction.
