A Proposal of the First Phase of a Complete Study of the Numerous Citations from the Thirteen Classics Found in Pre-Han and Han Traditional Texts

In 1989, Professor D.C. Lau put forward a proposal for the establishment of a database of the entire body of Pre-Han and Han traditional Chinese texts. Support was granted by the committee to the amount of 1.35M dollars. The database was completed in 1992 on schedule and was found by the RGC to be an "excellent research project" in 1995.

One of us (Ho Che-wah) joined the above project team from the very beginning and served as project coordinator as well as executive editor and was promoted to administrative director in 1996. He is familiar with results of the database and is therefore in a very good position to make use of the existing database for the pursuance of further studies. In our view, the database should support research which can reflect its diverse character. It is well known that the Thirteen classics, viz., the Liji 禮記, the Zhouli 周禮, the Yili 儀禮, the Zhouyi 周易, the Shangshu 尚書, the Maoshi 毛詩, the ChunQiu Zuozhuan 春秋左傳, the ChunQiu Gongyangzhuan 春秋公羊傳, the ChunQiu Guliangzhuan 春秋穀梁傳, the Lungyu 論 語, the Mengzi 孟子, the Erya 爾雅, the Xiaojing 孝 經, are looked upon as of the greatest importance to the sinologist. However, most of the extant editions of these Classics, even those of the Tang 唐 and Song 宋 dynasties, are not free from corruptions and differ significantly from those in Pre-Han & Han periods. It is up to us, to make use of the database to make an accurate collection of all the citations from these thirteen works found in Pre-Han & traditional texts. We could, furthermore, try to make use of the variant readings found in these citations to correct textual mistakes and to find out how these thirteen works were used in Pre-Han and Han periods. A Typological Study of Chinese Reduplication

This research project aims to test two basic The first hypothesis is *Positional* Faithfulness, by which lexical contrasts of featural contents are preserved in privileged positions (such as root-initial syllables, stressed syllables and syllable onset) and are neutralized in non-privileged positions (such as affix syllables, unstressed syllables and syllable coda). The second hypothesis is that partial reduplication with fixed segmentism results from the reduction of structural markedness, that the choice of segments copied is governed by the interaction between faithfulness and markedness constraints, and that different rankings of these constraints give rise to a cross-linguistic typology of reduplication. The investigation proposed comprises a literature survey of reduplication patterns across Chinese dialects against published data sources and an in-depth study of three selected Chinese dialects, namely, Mandarin, Fuzhou 福州 (a Min dialect spoken in the northeast Fujian province), and Qingtian 青田 (a Wu dialect spoken in the southern Zhejiang province). The findings will therefore make a major contribution to our understanding of reduplication typology in human language in general, and in Chinese in particular.

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Enhancing Attitudes to English as a Global Language Through the World Wide Web

This project will build on two previous funded projects, the first on attitudes to English among Hong Kong Chinese, and the second on the potential of global networking to effect change in integrative motivation in English language learning. There is a growing body of evidence that there are significant changes in such attitudes, especially among the young of Hong Kong, who no longer see English as an 'imperialist' language, but rather as a 'global' language. This finding was supported in both the above studies and points to an avenue of hope for the future of English in Hong Kong.

The present project will focus on senior secondary school students. The links between attitudes, motivation and proficiency will be further investigated as a prelude to exploration of the potential of the World Wide Web as a tool for improving attitudes to English language learning in schools.

With the co-operation of English Panel Heads, Websites from GISIG (Global Issues Special Interest Group) and LINGUAPAX, a UNESCO based website, will be used, together with other internationally orientated Websites. Local networks will be built up between schools for the spread of ideas and teaching materials. The project will be consistently monitored and evaluated. (AL98011)

Documenting the Realities of English Language **Teaching in Hong Kong Schools**

The aim of the project is to develop a collection of reality-based teaching cases, richly detailed narrative accounts of dilemmas that routinely confront English language teachers in Hong Kong schools from the perspectives of practicing English language school teachers. The cases will serve as representative samples of typical classroom events in the territory and can help ensure that the curriculum in local teacher education programs is attuned to and addresses the current realities of ELT practice in Hong Kong.

This project will provide student teachers in Hong Kong with contextually-relevant open-ended cases

that they can read, discuss, analyze, reflect on, and write about in their teacher education/language enhancement courses. The student teachers will be able to improve their overall English language proficiency as well as make connections between the theory presented in their teacher education courses and the sometimes confusing world of teaching practice. In the process, they can begin to think and act like practitioners. This project has the potential to revitalize ELT teacher education programs in Hong Kong and ensure that crucial issues in this context are dealt with in methodology courses.

A Study of Discourse in Diaspora Literature

The study of discourse is intended to provide a new way of reading that will enable the researchers to discern some previously unnoticed or unnoticeable features of diaspora literature, and to highlight the development of distinctive styles that is fundamental to diaspora writers' textual performance. The search for an appropriate discourse to express diaspora experience and anxiety reflects a critical selfconsciousness in writing that signifies as well as problematizes the socio-cultural condition that facilitates the discursive production of agency. As the potentiality of speaking subject is constituted through the activity of effective uttering, telling and narrating, diaspora writers have developed their own forms of discourse in which their special types of speech can be turned into self-making narratives. Through this study, the researchers hope to identify some patterns in diaspora discourse and to consider the roles of diaspora writing in mediating and defining cultural positions. (AL98037)

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An Analysis of Socio-Economic Success of Chinese Mainland Migrants in Hong Kong

This project is a pilot study of the influence of Mainland Chinese migrants of the 20th Century in the socio-economic development of Hong Kong. As a pilot study, it will trace the personal background of those prominent socio-economic figures in the 20th Century of Hong Kong and analyze how they came to climb up the socio-economic ladder of success. Methodology will involve a combination of biographical study and quantitative analysis of various regional associations (including the "shanghui" commercial associations, "tongxianghui" / same-native-place associations). Interviews and oral historical methods will also be used to provide more primary data for future research. This pilot study will hopeful serve to develop into a comprehensive and detailed analysis of the issue of socio-economic migration between China Mainland and Hong Kong in the current century. The Interactions of and Relationships Between Euro-American and Chinese Historiographies in the $20^{\rm th}$ Century

Historians try to integrate their present experience with their understanding and assessment of past events. The methods they use and theories they uphold reflect how the integration evolves and of historiographical develops. The study development of a certain period will help appreciate how historians react and interact with their time including how indigenous and foreign cultural influences have shaped their thoughts. The present project is a comprehensive and in-depth examination of how Euro-American historical methods and theories interacted with Chinese historiography and how the development of the latter was influenced by the former.

Since the mid-19th Century, China has been undergoing a long period of cultural reconstruction and modernization. The 1911 Revolution and the May Fourth Movement marked the beginning of a full swing Chinese attempt to look more closely into the more subtle aspects of Western culture including its historical tradition and historiography. Euro-American historiography and historical theories have

been imported into China during different periods and with different effects. The two most important periods of import of Western-liberal historiography were the first three decades of the Century (with May Fourth Movement as its landmark) and the 1980s (with the implementation of economic reform and liberalization). As for the Russian-socialist historiography, the debates of 1930s (over the nature of social history) and the building of the New China in the 1950s were also significant. The extremism of the Cultural Revolution also left an indelible mark on the interaction of Western-Chinese historiographies. The present project will examine the complex interactions and close relationships between Euro-American and Chinese historiographies, how the milieu of different periods condition these interactions and relationships, and how the development of Chinese historiography in light of these interactions and relationships should be evaluated.

To systematically and comprehensively trace the intricate experiences of Chinese historians in search of their framework of professional study of history will not only reveal the professional and emotional development of a very important sector of Chinese intellectuals but also appreciate the contributions of Chinese historians to the overall cultural reconstruction of modern China in the 20th Century. A Pilot Study of the Joint Research Project on Culture, Environment, Business and Human Resources in 20th Century Mainland China and Hong Kong

This project aims to reflect on the experience of China and Hong Kong in cultural development, manipulation of environment, social development, economic development, and human resources training and development. It includes a series of studies in collaboration with a number of universities in Mainland China. The project connects the study of environmental issues with cultural studies, which will help us evaluate past construction projects and provide guidance for future projects. State and Society in Han Empire: The Reach of the State in Donghai Commandery

Two thousand years ago, Han rulers succeeded in building a great empire with vast territory. It is now clear to historians that the Han rulers achieved this by inventing and introducing a complicated bureaucratic administration down to the society of very low level. By means of the recent evidences at Yinwan, Jiangsu province, this research plans to make a thorough investigation on the state administration of a political district, Donghai Commandery. This project will be structured as follows:

- (1) The process of state building in Han period.
- (2) Government administration in Donghai Commandery.
- (3) Great magnates in Donghai Commandery.
- (4) The reach of the state.

This research aims at understanding the early development of China as a great monolithic empire. (AL98012)

The Hong Kong Heritage in Yuen Long: A Historical and Cultural Study of Three Hakka Villages

The Hakka people in south China today still keep their ethnic distinctiveness including their own dialect and social customs. The Hakka settlements are also found in Hong Kong. The purpose of this project is, through an in-depth study of three villages in Yuen Long, to find out how the Hakka in Hong Kong adapted to the changing economic, social and political environments in this century; how they coped with the rapid social transformation when Hong Kong underwent urbanization beginning in the 1960's; and to what extent their relative smooth adaptation was due to the Hakka heritage. Specifically, the following aspects of the three selected villages will be studied:

- (1) The origins of the Hakka settlements and their subsequent development;
- (2) Economic activities including modes of production;
- (3) Educational and cultural activities; and
- (4) The impact of modernization on the villages concerned in view of Hong Kong's rapid urbanization since the 1960's.

In collecting the data necessary for subsequent analysis, field trips to these villages will be made and interviews with their residents, village heads and rural committee members will be conducted. In addition, archival researches will be done at the Public Records Office, the Lands Department and other pertinent agencies in the Hong Kong SAR Government. It is anticipated that a final report with analysis on historical and cultural development of the villages, supplemented with both written and audio-

visual documents, will be prepared upon the completion of the research project. (AL98029)

Shenzhen and Hong Kong: A Comparative Study of Urban Cultures

This research is a comparative study of Hong Kong and Shenzhen. The project has two objectives. First, it aims to, with a historical and empirical approach, review the historical and cultural development Shenzhen and Hong Kong by surveying "supplements" of newspaper, cultural magazines, and other publications in the last three decades. It also deals with the histriography and discourse on history, inquiring how cultural history and literary history has been defined and written, and how collective memories are defined and redefined.

The second objective of the project is to analyse and compare some important and intriguing themes such as immigration and emigration, the pressure and pleasure of urban life, the transvaluation of values, and the problems of cultural identity and relationship between traditional and modern, elitist and popular cultures. The concepts of Cultural Space, Cultural Identity, and Cultural History will be used for analysis.

Compilation of the Late Professor Yen Kengwang's Manuscripts for Publication

本計劃由嚴耕望先生生前長期任職之中央研究院歷史語言研究所及香港中文大學歷史系合作推動,擬以兩年為期,整理嚴耕望先生部分遺稿,希望能編集成書出版,嘉惠士林。目前主要項目為《唐代交通圖考》第六卷及《魏晉南北朝佛教地理長編》兩種。

按《唐代交通圖考》為嚴院士生前視作畢生學使畢生學術貢獻精華所在之大型研究計劃,前後積累五十載功夫,其中前半部已增訂完成並由中央研究院歷史語言研究所於民國七十五年出版引,五卷,五十餘篇,都兩百萬言。內容詳微博引,無論辨精密,創獲至多,當世有關課題之撰述野中共力國歷史地理學樹立論證典範,信為當代中國史學重要貢獻之一。先生其後雖以七十高齡而

Voluntarism in Japan: Why Ordinary People Take Public Roles

This research is based on an ethnographic study of the lives of residents of an urban neighborhood who adopt the identity of "volunteers" (borantia), a recognizable social identity that has emerged in Japan over the past two decades. This project (1) introduces the meanings of borantia in the Japanese print media, (2) examines individual life stories to discern how individuals negotiate their civic commitments and the mainstream social expectations that men provide for their families through success at work and that women devote themselves to family care giving and (3) through a close analysis of local social dramas, explores how residents strategically adopt the mainstream discourses of voluntarism and public responsibility to fashion meanings that reverberate locally and within a national context. This project directs attention to the civic sphere, an arena that in Japan is usually thought to be dominated by state and lacking in public interest. The civic sphere is shown to be vital to the formation of new urban communities, and an avenue in which individuals shape identities in a local world and through the life cycle. This study considers gender roles through the civic sphere where feminine care giving is combined with masculine public service, and demonstrates how individuals who volunteer shape and are shaped by institutional channels of society, and by the public discourses through which volunteers formulate their identities and justify their actions. 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Crossovers and Connections in Hong Kong Culture: The Adaptations of Cantonese Opera into Cantonese Opera Films, 1950's - 1960's

The present project will be conducted in two stages: The first stage will concern itself with the comparison of general characteristics between the two media: theatre and film, and to problems, aesthetic, mediumistic and technical, arising from adaptations from one medium to the other. The second stage will deal with specific adaptations of Cantonese opera into Cantonese opera films in Hong Kong, calling attention to esthetic, economic, technical, sociopolitico-cultural issues arising from these crossovers. For example, does the film destroy the aesthetic qualities on the stage? How does the opera film compete or supersede the opera in the market of consumerism? Hoes does the opera cinema supplement or detract the inherent techniques on the stage or naturalize them? How can it reconcile stage techniques incompatible to the screen? What sort of moral or edifying function does the opera film perform to the Hong Kong society, inspired by or borrowing from traditional stories from classical Chinese drama? The focus will be on the works from the 1950's to the late 1960's. Some current reading and analytic strategies such as mass culture theory, genre theory, star-studies and cultural studies will be adopted.

The project purports to study the unique relationship between Cantonese opera and Cantonese opera films in a more scholarly and in-depth manner, hopefully fulfilling the goal of making knowledge really useful in a wider Hong Kong socio-cultural context. The study of adaptation will be more than explicating sufficiencies or insufficiencies of film adaptations; it will look upon film (Cantonese opera film) as literature and as extension of the stage, and the analyses of these films hopefully will contribute to new horizons of esthetic, literary, mediumistic and edifying investigations in both film and theatre studies.

Ritual of *Houtu* Worship and Village Music Associations in Laishui and Yixian of Hebei Province

Houtu, goddess of earth, is an important goddess in the belief systems of religious Daoism and popular cults in China. Rituals of Houtu worship are prevalent in rural China, particularly in villages of Hebei province, where *Houto* is not only an almighty goddess of local popular cult but also the goddess of village yinyuehui (music associations). During every Lunar New Year's holidays, rituals are performed in celebration of Houtu by members of the village yinyuehui. Amidst the percussion music of faqi (ritual objects) and chanting, the yinyuehui also performs baoguan (precious scrolls), a type of semisacred narrative music that is rarely heard in China today. In Laishui and Yixian (about 100 miles southwest of Beijing), both the traditions of Houtu worship and yinyuehui are fairly well preserved (there are more than ten music associations each in Laishui and Yixian). This study aims to compile regional profiles of yinyuehui in Laishui and Yixian and to analyze their music repertories within the wider ritual contexts of *Houtu* worship. (AL98007)

The Chinese Musical Sources Research Project

The project aims to make the rich musical sources of China accessible to historians, musicians, and researchers of related fields. We will start with the last Qing dynasty (1644-1911), the richest and the most fruitful period of Chinese history in terms of musical sources, and go back to the earlier dynasties in the future. The emphasis will be on the changes and development in the way Chinese viewed yue 樂 ("music") under the almost three-hundred year Manchu regime.

We will assemble the available music and music related data of the Qing dynasty from governmental and private documents, classify and systematize them, and eventually publish updated annotated bibliography and source materials. Previous studies focus mainly on music. The proposed project may stretch out for the ritual, political, religious and social materials related to music.

The result of the project will make these obscure sources easily available to researchers and students of Chinese music history. Such fundamental work will certainly enhance our understanding of Chinese music and history. It also serves as indispensable tools for further research. All these prepare for future publication of modern critical edition of important music treatises and monographs on Qing dynasty music.

Philosophical Investigation of Linguistic Strategies in Zhuangzi and Chan Buddhism

This project is a new philosophical investigation of linguistic strategies in the Daoist Zhuangzi and in Chan Buddhism. The main scope of the investigation includes deconstructive strategy, liminology of language and pragmatics of indirect communication. These three themes are prevalent topics in contemporary Western philosophical discourse. Although these categories are new to Chinese philosophical discourse, the investigation of these topics will refer to many important aspects of these two Chinese philosophical and religious traditions. The methodology of this investigation is to borrow new concepts from contemporary Western philosophy, to redefine them and to reexamine two Chinese traditions of thought under these categories. The possibility of applying these concepts to Chinese context is based on a close reading or examination of historical texts. The researcher will establish his interpretation on solid textual grounds and avoid reading Western concepts into Chinese texts. The prospect of this project will not only be a

reinterpretation or rediscovery of two traditions in contemporary context, but also a participation in contemporary philosophical discourse or an articulation of Daoist or Chan Buddhist perspectives on contemporary issues. It will make significant contributions to a philosophical dialogue between East and West in general. (AL98031)

Moral Distinctions and the Morality of Euthanasia

This project examines certain moral controversies surrounding euthanasia, among which is the controversy concerning the view that there is a moral distinction between passive and active euthanasia. This view, though hotly debated among philosophers, is widely endorsed by medical practitioners, as revealed by the policy statement of the American Medical Association on the cessation of the employment of extraordinary means to prolong the life of the body. Some philosophers, e.g. James Rachels, argue that the AMA's position is incoherent. Some of these arguments will be analyzed and evaluated. The project will also provide a conceptual scrutiny of some other related distinctions often encountered in debates on euthanasia: the distinction between ordinary treatment and extraordinary treatment, the distinction between act and omission, and the doctrine of double effect. Semantics of Quantified Modal Logic

This is a study in philosophical logic with special interest in the semantic interpretation of modal logic. Rigid designation, a fundamental notion in modal semantics, has been put to philosophical use in various branches of philosophy since its introduction by Saul Kripke in the seventies. But theorists have since debated whether rigid designation should be construed in terms of existence. One aim of this study is to shed light on this issue. For this purpose a version of Kripke's semantics is constructed for the most fruitful system of quantified modal logic QS5 and is used to demonstrate that individual variables, arguably rigid designators par excellence, behave in accordance with the 'existence' interpretation.

A Study of the Hong Kong Chinese Churches' Understanding of Financial Assistance: Its Theology (theory), Measures and Effectiveness

This is an inter-disciplinary study of the theory, measures and effectiveness of financial assistance. The context of this study is the Hong Kong Chinese Christian churches. On the one hand, this study reviews the theological foundation of financial assistance of the Christian churches. On the other hand, with the aid of the contemporary sociological theories, it examines how effective financial assistance is carried out in the churches. The purpose of this study is not only to suggest how the churches may administer their financial assistance in a more effective way, but also serves as a foundation for the further study of the role of non-governmental organisations in coping with poverty. A Study of the History of the Way of the Celestial Masters Under the Six Dynasties

The subject of this research plan will be focused on the study of the Doaist sect of the Way of the Celestial Masters (天師道) during the Six Dynasties (A.D. 318-589). The key question that guides this research is how the Daoist sect, which firstly appeared in the Shu (Sichuan) and later spread out through the north of China, established its own unique religious identity in the south of China (江南 Jiangnan). In other words, this research will study how the sect developed itself as a significant localized religious tradition in the south. In addition, this study will examine how the Celestial Master Daoism was challenged and enriched by native southern religious practices and values as well as the growth of the influences of Buddhism upon Chinese religious world since the beginning of the fourth century.

This research will begin with a survey and analysis of about 15-20 scriptures complied by Celestial Master Daoism that can safely dated from the period between the Later Han and the early six centuries. Research will be guided by the following questions:

(1) Can researchers define what elements were belonged to the Way of the Celestial Masters that

- they were not affected by the southern religious beliefs and practices?
- (2) What kinds of borrowing and assimilation do researchers find between the Way of the Celestial Masters and other southern Daoist sects within the same period such as the sects of Shangqing (上清派) and Lingbao (靈寶派)?
- (3) What elements were selected from the immense corpus of Mahayana Buddhism as it gradually became known in the course of this period?
- (4) Since processes of adoption and influence usually imply a form of self-redefinition and self-re-creation, can researchers define what types of reformation and changes added to the Celestial Master community in the south?

Methodological Compatibility of Religious and Theological Studies

The relationship between theological studies and religious studies is a fundamental question to the further development of the two disciplines. It is also a matter of concern for both theologians and scholars of religious studies. The Bulletin of the Council of Societies for the Study of Religion made the compatibility of theological and religious studies the main theme of one of its recent issues (Vol.26, No.3, September 1997). It is widely held that the method of theological studies and that of religious studies are radically different and even incompatible. While theological studies seems to concentrate on one religion only, religious studies investigates many religions. While theological studies is subjected to the authority of divine revelation, religious studies is an objective study of religions requiring no religious belief from the researcher and maintaining neutrality with regard to different religions. The present research aims at challenging this received opinion by examining critically whether and in what way the two disciplines can be compatible and integrated. (AL98014)

The Religious World of Chinese Classical Writings

Religion and culture are not to be separated when it comes to the understanding of the world of the Chinese. From reading the Shijing, Shujing, Yijing and Liji, one is confronted with the religious world of the ancients in terms of religious concepts, rituals,

sacrificial rites, dynastic songs and liturgical prayers. Even the so-called "folk songs" of Guofeng in the Shijing contains religious ideas; the laments and cries to Tian and Shangdi cannot simply be treated as nonreligious. Unfortunately, the political orientation of the commentary tradition has given rise to the total neglect of the religiosity of these texts. This is further aggregated by the general anti-religious sentiment of the post-May 4^h Chinese Intellectuals and the almost indifference of Neo-Confucianism to the religious world of the classical texts. The quest for democracy and modern science in the secular outlook of the twentieth century do not facilitate the recovery of the religious world of these texts. Modern cultural theories have, however, play a concentrated attention to the role of religion in cultural formation and transformation. A modern reading of Chinese classical writings with the aim to recover the religious world of the Chinese will reshape our interpretation and comprehension of the

The pilot project is composed of 6 parts, each dealing with a selected set of religious texts in a period in the Chinese history. We shall divide the history of Chinese religion into six periods, namely,

- (1) Pre-Qin,
- (2) the Two Han's,
- (3) Wei-Jin and the Northern and Southern Dynasties,
- (4) Sui, Tang and the Five Dynasties,
- (5) Song and Yuan, and
- (6) Ming and Qing.

A comprehensive catalogue of the writings will be drawn up for each of the period. An initial survey of the works will be done. Papers will also be written to demonstrate the presence of the religious world in these texts. Example will be taken from the Book of Poetry in the first stage. Experts in the studies of classics in each of these periods to create a catalogue of the religious texts of the period. The final aim of the project will a production of an anthology with commentaries on the texts, aiming to introduce to modern readers the contents, thoughts, and practices of traditional Chinese religions, as well as the roles they played in Chinese society and culture. Septuagintal Studies for Modern Chinese Readers

The term "Septuagint" (henceforth, "LXX", signifying "70") was referred to the Greek translation of the Hebrew Old Testament. Ever since its appearance in the Second Century B.C.E. and until the Reformation, it was considered the inspired Bible by both Jews and Christians. Nevertheless, the importance of this translation has not been attended

professionally. The project, entitled "SEPTUAGINTAL STUDIES FOR MODERN CHINESE READERS", is the first and only thorough study ever done in Chinese. It aims not only to introduce the importance of LXX, but to investigate how recent researches in Septuagint studies should justify a re-interpretation and re-translation of the Chinese Bible. In particular, it focuses on three aspects of contributions of LXX.

First, since the Hebrew text of the translation antedates our present Hebrew Old Testament text by almost a millenium, LXX provides us an opportunity where we could get a glimpse of a more ancient, and perhaps better, Hebrew text. Second, since almost all New Testament authors used LXX as their inspired Bible from which they had their quotations, LXX provides the context in which many of the lexical and theological concepts in the NT can best be explained. Third, since LXX has been used throughout the Church history until the Reformation, many of the Church tradition (in particular, the Roman Catholic tradition) found their roots in the Septuagint; in particular, the so-called Old Testament apocrypha which the Protestant Bible did not include, has always been there in the LXX.

The task of the project is a difficult one but would prove to be of immense value to the understanding of the Church tradition and history.

A Study of the Debates on the Place of Women in Church and Society in Hong Kong Today

repudiated the relevance of Sex Discrimination Ordinance for the Church, the Church is setting its religious tradition against society's call for sex equality. In effect, the Church, being exempted from the Ordinance, is pronouncing publicly that for religious reasons men must be the leaders and women the subordinates. However, besides the theological argument of men being the only proper representation of Jesus Christ the Savior. much of the debates have in fact drawn on the Chinese Confucian understanding of "men be responsible for 'outside' (of the home) and women 'inside'" (nan tsu wei nu tsu nei) and the belief of a complimentary nature of masculinity being the active principle and femininity being the passive principle. To understand the kind of reasoning and justification Christian community has been engaging in on defining women's place in church and society, this project therefore aims at:

(1) a socio-political analysis on the male and female composition of sampling churches, including their membership, parish councils and hierarchies:

- (2) a critical review of the theological interpretations the Chinese Christians have adopted for defining women's place; and
- (3) a critical assessment of the impact of Chinese Confucian values on Christians' views toward defining the place of women in the Church.

A History of C-E/E-C Machine Translation

Machine translation in China started as early as 1956, but it was not until 1958 that the first English-Chinese translation algorithm was established -- a collaborative endeavour of six major Mainland Institutes. However unsophisticated early MT algorithms may be, they have laid a good foundation for future developments.

Over the next two decades, a number of more advanced C-E/E-C MT algorithms were worked out and tested on computers whereas advances in English syntactic analysis and semantic studies were also applied to Machine Translation. In 1968, the "Chinese University Language Translator" project (CULT) was launched out in Hong Kong. The C-E MT system concerned, which required human intervention, was the first of its kind in the then colony. The year 1978 bore witness to another breakthrough in Chinese MT research. Following the introduction of a new and successfully tested E-C algorithm at the Institute of Computing Technology, the field flourished significantly with instant establishment of several major MT centres in the region. From 1983 onwards, MT research in China has entered an era of development of commercially marketable machine systems, one of which being TRANSTAR, which is a unidirectional (E-C) semantic- transfer- based MT system using both grammar-driven and lexicon-driven rulebases and offering both basic and technical-term dictionaries. More recently, significant advances in C-E/E-C MT software development have been made in Mainland China, Taiwan and Hong Kong. The project intends to examine the strengths and weaknesses of the newest softwares available in the market, such as 《譯經》 (Taiwan) and 《漢神》 (Mainland China). (AL98036)

A Critical Inquiry into Assessment in Translation Teaching

This study, by using a qualitative case study method, makes a critical investigation of translation assessment and testing in the Chinese-English translation teaching context. Drawing on the studies in educational measurement and language testing, this study will also explore alternative methods of

translation assessment in the hope that they will better capture students' translation competence and proficiency. The primary modes of data collection will be a survey of related literature, a questionnaire survey of translation instructors and follow-up interviews with them.

Towards the Construction of a Theory: Translation Process and Multimedia

Multimedia originates from the arts and education where there is an ongoing tradition of experimentation in how information is conveyed. (Barrett E. ed. *Sociomedia*,1992) All the multimedia performances and presentations explore the use of various sensory channels and modes of expression. This existing tradition is presently being enlarged by a new type of multimedia, namely digital technology through the manipulation of desktop computers.

Inspired by this concept on multimedia framework, I find parallels in the translation process: how the original "information" of the source text is conveyed and transformed into another language to the fullest. On the other hand, according to Marshall McLuhan, "The medium is the message". What he says is that "the means of communication (the medium) has more of an effect (message) than any information it communicates." McLuhan views communication techniques as extension of our bodies and sense. In other words, technologies are never neutral- they are not simply transparent vehicles for delivering messages. Rather, as they extend our senses, they transform them, alternating our relationship to space and time and affecting our interactions with the world. In the same sense, a translator's editing dominates the whole translation process in relation to the effect he or she is supposed to transform. For example, when a visual image of a given text is lost in the translation process, an audial element may be used in the creation of the target text in order to achieve the equivalent effect. This pilot investigation may open a new field for translation studies. (AL98048)

Translation and Politics: A Comprehensive Study of the Translation Activities of the Late Qing

The project will study the various translation activities undertaken by both the government and the individuals during the late Qing. The focus of the project is on the relationship between these translation activities and the socio-political situation of the time. Several key issues will be handled in depth. First, the translators. Who were they and what special qualities did they possess? What were their motives in taking up translation? Second, the patrons. Who supported the translations and why? In what ways did they affect the translators and the translations? Third, the originals. What were translated and why were they chosen? Fourth, the translations. How were the works translated and why were they translated in their particular ways? Fifth, the impact. What influences were made on society and thinking of the time?

The end-products of the project will probably be two books. One is a collection of the first-hand materials, mainly writings on translation written during the period. Other researchers will find it a convenient tool for the study of late Qing translations. The second one will be a book written by me, which will be a comprehensive study of the topic. Different chapters will be devoted to different types of translation activities. (CU98109)
